A WIDE RANGE OF COURSE OFFERINGS and Virginia's faculty — prominent in areas such as immigration law, international human rights, environmental policy, comparative constitutional law and international business — make Virginia's international law program one of the strongest in the nation. Foreign professors are regularly invited to the Law School to teach seminars on topics such as European Union law and comparative law, and students may take select courses at the neighboring Judge Advocate General's Legal Center and School (JAG School). Virginia's international law program attracts speakers from around the world, including leaders of international institutions and public interest organizations, officials from the U.S. State Department and other government agencies, international law scholars and practicing international lawyers.



CAITLIN STAPLETON '09 was chosen to be the fifth consecutive Virginia Law student in the International Court of Justice's trainee program. Stapleton will receive up to \$40,000 to support her nine-month clerkship through the Orrick International Law Fellowship, a competitive award sponsored by the Law School and law firm Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe.

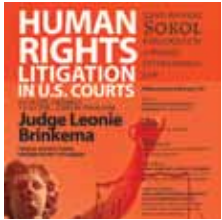
SPECIAL CENTERS AND PROGRAMS

Center for National Security Law

Established in 1981, the Center for National Security Law is a nonpartisan institution dedicated to the promotion of interdisciplinary advanced research, scholarship and education about legal issues affecting U.S. national security. The center brings scholars from around the globe to the Law School for conferences, symposia and lectures, and sponsors a yearly National Security Institute for government officials and scholars in international law and international relations.

The Center for Oceans Law and Policy promotes rational management of the world's oceans and coastal and polar areas through teaching, research and discussion

can handle the legal challenges of terrorism cases if they undergo minor reforms and refinements, Judge Leonie M. Brinkema told attendees of the Law School's 22nd Annual Sokol Colloquium on Private International Law.

"Just some tweaks of the tools at our fingertips will allow these cases to be handled in civilian courts," said Brinkema, the judge who presided over the trial of Sept. 11 conspirator Zacarias Moussaoui.

Brinkema delivered the keynote address at the 2009 conference, co-sponsored by the J.B. Moore Society of International Law and the Virginia Journal of International Law.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

John Bassett Moore Society of International Law

The J.B. Moore Society is a driving force in international law activities at the Law School. Each year the society hosts a symposium on topics such as the war on terror or corruption in foreign governments, as well as a lunch lecture series in which international law faculty and foreign graduate students present papers. The society sponsors the Jessup International Law Moot Court team and coordinates with the Charlottesville office of the International Rescue Committee to help recently settled refugees.

Virginia Journal of International Law

Now in its fifth decade, the Virginia Journal of International Law is the oldest continuously published, student-edited law review in the United States devoted exclusively to the fields of public and private international law. It is the most frequently cited student-edited

journal of international and comparative law, and the third-most-frequently cited student-edited specialty journal of any kind.

INTERNATIONAL STUDY

Exchange Programs

Second- and third-year students may participate in five international exchange programs at the following schools:

- UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE (AUSTRALIA)
- UNIVERSITY OF NOTTINGHAM (ENGLAND)
- TEL AVIV UNIVERSITY LAW SCHOOL (ISRAEL)
- BUCERIUS LAW SCHOOL (HAMBURG, GERMANY)
- WASEDA UNIVERSITY (TOKYO)

Third-year students may also obtain a combined degree from University Paris 1 Pantheon – Sorbonne Law School and Sciences Po/Paris. Students completing the program will receive a J.D. from the Law School and a French law degree, entitling them to sit for the French bar exam. Students also may initiate their own study-abroad program at a foreign university law school or law department for one semester.

January Term Abroad

The Law School offers a one-credit course abroad in Paris during the January term over winter break.

Semester Abroad

Students may spend a semester abroad in a supervised setting combining academic legal research and work experience. Past projects have examined judicial reform in Argentina and the strategy of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia.

External Combined-Degree Programs

Virginia offers external combined-degree programs in public international law with the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University and at the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies.
